



The Importance of Our Services

Many individuals with serious mental health and substance use disorders frequently use the local emergency rooms for treatment or end up in local jails, which causes a financial burden on local hospitals and the government. It is estimated untreated adults with serious behavioral health disorders and substance use disorders cost the Greater Kansas City metro area \$624 million per year. The statistics below show the savings for just 50 clients.




The Therapeutic Community of Benilde Hall:

2019 & 2020 Services provided by Benilde Hall include:


- Housing Transitional housing services for 75 men and long-term independent housing for 12 men.
- Substance Use Disorder Treatment All residents participate in a recovery program that includes group counseling, community groups, individual counseling, and community service.
- Services for Persons with Co-occurring Disorders On-site psychological services & psychiatric services for clients with a dual diagnosis of a substance use disorder and a behavioral health disorder.
- Case Management Depending on the unique needs of the resident, clients may receive employment counseling, independent living skills, recreation activities, legal advocacy & referrals, transportation, spirituality, financial counseling, and referrals to community self-help groups.
- Benilde Services is a compensated work program providing employment opportunities to the men of Benilde Hall. The program provides lawn care, nursery & landscaping, painting, snow removal, and repair services to the community. Clients at Benilde Hall also have the opportunity to work in our kitchen to earn a consistent income and gain valuable skills.
- Safe Haven Housing to serve up to 25 male and female chronically homeless Veterans with mental health disorders and substance use disorders.






2019 Revenue: \$1,860,025




2020 Revenue: \$2,061,589.75
